

WORSHIP notes from Fr. Jenson

The 1st Sunday of Advent begins the Church's new year, and as such, we switch Gospel reading cycles for Sunday masses from the Gospel of St. Matthew this past year to the Gospel of St. Mark. For daily personal bible reading, the Gospel of St. Mark would make for good spiritual reading as this will have the advantage of familiarizing one with the readings one will hear in Mass during the year.

This weekend's Gospel reading theme is to be watchful and alert. The master has gone for an unknown length of time, and the servants are to remain active and alert in their duties lest they be unprepared for his return. The master, of course, is the Lord Jesus, and we are the servants awaiting His return. It's easy to become distracted from the Lord

during the day, and we must remember to make time for Him. Once this happens more frequently, Mass attendance starts to fall off, we stop going to Confession, and before long, we no longer have an active relationship with the Lord. Sadly, this is the case for most baptized people left unprepared for the Lord's return.

We begin the season of Advent. Like Lent, Advent is a time of preparation to spiritually enter into one of the most significant moments in salvation history. This moment in salvation history is the birth of our Savior, born of Mary, to redeem us at Christmas.

Christmas shopping has little to do with preparing for Christmas as a Christian. That is about us and making ourselves happy. Nothing is wrong with that if it expresses our joy at the birth of God's only Son, who has become one of us by the power of the Holy Spirit at Bethlehem. But for most, all the shopping has little to do with Jesus or Christianity anymore. The unchurched do as much Christmas shopping as any church-going Christian. Gift-giving has lost its meaning.

Advent is a time just like Lent to sharpen our focus on our faith and how we live it. In so doing, we prepare our hearts and souls to honor and rejoice Jesus Christ come Christmas. Advent is when we try to create a gift for Him in our hearts. Our prayers and our actions with others figure into that. Ask Blessed Mother Mary to help develop a beautiful gift for her Son Jesus. Then, Christmas gift-giving can take on its actual meaning again. Have a blessed and faith-filled Advent.





The Church began to celebrate the feast of Mary's conception in the early Middle Ages. In 1854, Pope Pius IX infallibly declared that Mary was free of original sin from the first moment of her conception. On this feast day, we celebrate the beauty and goodness of Our Lady!

First Reading


In prayer, the prophet Isaiah grieves over our sins that separates us from God. What sorrow or distress have you experienced over the past week?

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why haven't Catholic Churches gone the way of disposable cups for wine distribution?

Answer:

If a Catholic has ever attended a Protestant worship service and saw the communion service that was offered for that community, one of the things that might have stood out was the use of small, disposable cups for distributing the wine or grape juice. This is in stark contrast to the precious metal chalices used in Catholic churches during the Mass.

Although practices for Protestant Christians can vary (ranging from large shared chalices, to personal-use cups, to dipping the bread in the wine/grape juice), the norms governing Catholic practices are fairly direct: "Sacred vessels are to be made from precious metal. If they are made from metal that rusts or from a metal less precious than gold, then ordinarily they should be gilded on the inside. In the Dioceses of the United States of America, sacred vessels may also be made from other solid materials that, according to the common estimation in each region, are precious ... they are to have bowls of nonabsorbent material" (nos. 328-330). Rather than being a commentary on the beliefs or practices of those other communities, these rules are intended to highlight the reverence that Catholics have for the bread and wine consecrated at Mass, which become the Body and Blood the Lord.


OUESTION + ANSWER

Q: If God knows everything we do, why do we need to go to Confession?



A: Another term for the Sacrament of Confession is the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We go to this sacrament not only to confess our sins, but to be reconciled with God. Of course, this begs the question, "If I can pray to God on my own, why can't I be reconciled to God on my own?" In the seven sacraments, we recognize the importance of community. Sacraments like baptism or matrimony happen in the context of the wider church to remind us of the communal impact of our lives. We are not alone in our walk of faith!

We don't need to confess our sins in front of the whole community – thank God! But going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation is a tangible reminder that our sins affect not only ourselves and our relationship with God, but others as well. Jesus gave his Apostles authority to forgive sins in his name. Through this sacrament, we are really, truly forgiven by God Himself. We receive an outpouring of grace and strength to sin no more and our relationship with Christ and his Body, the Church, are restored.

BEING OPEN TO GOD'S WILL


Good and gracious God,


